She mentioned various forms of mental illness including depression, bi-polar disorder, perinatal depression, post-natal psychosis and the increasing problems caused by cyber-bullying. She impressed on us that such problems defy logic. She told us how difficult it had been for her and her family when there were no support systems such as Beyond Blue.

Guest Speaker - Neville Locker

Neville has been interested in history for a significant amount of time and in the Cooma/Monaro area for about the last 50 years.

This conversation was about a little known Polish Explorer named John Lhotsky who arrived in Sydney about 1830.


He was a well-educated man who spoke Polish, Czech, English, German and French and studied geology and medicine.

In 1834, he undertook a trek to the Australian Alps with a horse and cart and two convict servants.

He arrived at Michelago, which was the point at which the 'beyond the limits of location' started. He noted that this area was quite natural and uncivilized.



He crossed the Murrumbidgee River and encountered local Aboriginal people of the area and recorded about 160 words of the local dialect. He also recorded a song of from the women which he published on his return to Sydney.



It is surmised that this is the first piece of indigenous music shared with Anglo people. He continued on arriving in Bunyan where he met Dr Reid and ex-naval doctor and one of the first to bring sheep to the Monaro. Then on to Cuma (Cooma) where he met with Bath, the overseer of Cuma Station.



He recorded details of 31 major properties

with stock numbers in the vicinity of 40,000 sheep and 23,000 head of cattle. This is interesting, as there was not meant to be any (white) people living in the area. He visited Rock Flat mineral springs which he reported were as good as anything in Europe. He then continued over the Snowy River at what is now Buckley's Crossing and on to Delegate.

On his return to Sydney he published the first part of his journal but as it didn't generate much interest he didn't publish the second part.

In relation to the local Aboriginal tribes of the Monaro it is interesting to know they were matriarchal and at a gravesite located near Bunyan a necklace made up from 326 kangaroo teeth were found with a female body, indicating she was a very important person in her group. This necklace was carbon dated back to about 7000 years ago.

In the 1960's an archeologist, Josephine Flood, located a site a Christchurch, near the rubbish tip, from which over 2000 archeological items were found (and removed).
